COMMUNITY SUPPORT DURING COVID-19
April to October 2020

Whilst we are all suffering the unprecedented losses of revenue, unfortunately things have been extremely difficult for many of our community neighbours. Most of these people relied directly on revenue channels from tourism. For example, our Masai neighbours were making small incomes from selling their beaded wares or charging entrance fees to tourists who wished to visit their traditional homesteads (Manyattas). Others earned monthly rentals from safari camps which operate in the conservancies.

The camps of the Mara struggled to pay these rents since they didn't have any guests in camp to cover the nightly conservancy fees. Thousands of people were of course employed in the safari camps themselves or provided services such as transport or sold basic supplies to many of the families who relied on these tourism revenues.

The Masai are traditionally pastoralists who sell their cattle at weekly markets. With government enforced restrictions, they were not allowed to sell their cows thus crippling their only other potential source of income. Nobody was left unaffected. Early on we recognised that this situation was a recipe for disaster.

Without an income to feed their families, many people have been forced to turn to illegal activities such as setting wire snares to capture wild animals (the bushmeat as it is known can be sold at a fraction of the price of conventional sources of meat) or felling indigenous hardwood trees for timber or charcoal production. The threat of poaching for ivory and rhino horn also increased. All of these activities are extremely detrimental to the workings of a healthy ecosystem.

Overall, our aim was to raise funds in order to facilitate large-scale community food drives, thereby providing basic food and hygiene supplies to some of the most vulnerable families in our neighbouring communities in both Kenya and Rwanda.

So far, we have provided these supplies to between 80 - 200 in the Masai Mara each month since June, between 40 - 50 families near to Loldia House since July and between 60 - 80 families in Laikipia since August this year.

In Rwanda we have been facilitating food drives since April, with a total of 24 weekly donations; we support a number of unmarried mothers from the Turengerubuzima Women's Sewing Group and their dependents in the immediate area of Sabyinyo Silverback Lodge. In addition to this, we have rebuilt Mama Speciose's house which has spawned additional community-driven groups to achieve five further similar home rebuilds within the area.

A big thank you to our good friend Margot Ragget who arranged a huge amount of the Rwanda donations.
